PROCLAMATION

BY THE GOVERNOR

WHEREAS, sepsis is the body's extreme reaction to almost any type of infection and can cause high heart rate, low blood pressure, shortness of breath, confusion, pain, and/or fevers; and

WHEREAS, sepsis is a life-threatening condition, as it can lead to tissue damage, organ failure, or possibly death; and

WHEREAS, according to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, each year sepsis affects at least 1.7 million adults in the United States, and at least 350,000 adults who develop sepsis die during their hospitalization or are discharged to hospice; and

WHEREAS, young children and the elderly have a higher risk of developing sepsis; and

WHEREAS, the signs of sepsis can be remembered with the mnemonic device "TIME," which stands for Temperature, Infection, Mental decline, and Extremely ill; and

WHEREAS, awareness of the signs and symptoms of sepsis along with rapid diagnosis and treatment can save lives and improve outcomes of survivors;

NOW, THEREFORE, I, Bill Lee, Governor of the State of Tennessee, do hereby proclaim the month of September 2023, as

Sepsis Awareness Month

in Tennessee and encourage all citizens to join me in this worthy observance.
