PROCLAMATION
BY THE GOVERNOR

WHEREAS, Complex Regional Pain Syndrome (CRPS), also known as Reflex Sympathetic Dystrophy (RSD) is a nerve disorder that causes chronic pain; and

WHEREAS, the symptoms of CRPS are often described as burning that is out of proportion to the severity of the initial injury and can include swelling and extreme sensitivity to touch; and

WHEREAS, while CRPS was first identified during the Civil War, it remains a poorly-understood condition; and

WHEREAS, a cure has not yet been found; and

WHEREAS, on November 7, 2016, members of the CRPS/RSD community will be celebrating the third annual "Color The World Orange Day" to spread awareness of this poorly understood pain disorder;

NOW, THEREFORE, I, Bill Haslam, Governor of the State of Tennessee, do hereby proclaim November 7, 2016 as

*Complex Regional Pain
Syndrome Awareness Day*

in Tennessee and encourage all citizens to join me in this worthy observance.
