PROCLAMATION

BY THE GOVERNOR

WHEREAS, colorectal cancer is the fourth most commonly diagnosed cancer and the second most common cause of cancer deaths for men and women combined in the United States; and

WHEREAS, every 4 minutes, someone is diagnosed with colorectal cancer and every 10 minutes someone dies from colorectal cancer; and

WHEREAS, the vast majority of colorectal cancer deaths can be prevented through proper screening and early detection; and

WHEREAS, only 39 percent of colorectal cancer patients have their cancers detected at an early stage; and

WHEREAS, the 5-year relative survival rate of individuals who have early stage colorectal cancer is 90 percent but is only 13 percent when diagnosed after it has spread to other organs; and

WHEREAS, if the majority of people in the United States age 50 or older were screened regularly for colorectal cancer using coloscopy, the death rate from certain types of this disease could plummet by up to 70 percent; and

WHEREAS, colorectal cancer is preventable, treatable, and beatable in most cases when caught early during disease progression; and

WHEREAS, observing Colorectal Cancer Awareness Month during the month of March provides a special opportunity to offer education on the importance of early detection and screening;

NOW, THEREFORE, I, Bill Haslam, Governor of the State of Tennessee, do hereby proclaim the month of March, 2018 as

Colorectal Cancer Awareness Month

in Tennessee and encourage all citizens to join me in this worthy observance.
