



STATE OF TENNESSEE
PROCLAMATION
BY THE GOVERNOR

WHEREAS, the Tennessee Safe Haven Law went into effect on July 1, 2001 and was amended in May 2009, and allows a mother to relinquish a newborn infant to personnel at a hospital, birthing center, community health clinic, outpatient, walk-in clinic, EMS facility, fire station, or law enforcement facility, anonymously and free from fear of prosecution; and

WHEREAS, relinquished babies then may become custody of the state and are placed in a responsible and nurturing safe haven; and

WHEREAS, the Tennessee Safe Haven Law provides a safe alternative to abandonment for Tennessee mothers who feel they cannot care for a newborn baby; and

WHEREAS, it is the hope of the State of Tennessee that as awareness of this law increases, it will stop the abandonment of newborn infants, a practice that has led to healthy babies being found harmed, deceased or in unsafe places; and

WHEREAS, since the signing of the Tennessee Safe Haven Law, numerous newborn babies have been safely relinquished in Tennessee pursuant to this Law, but at the same time, newborn infants continue to be unsafely abandoned; and

WHEREAS, the Tennessee Safe Haven Law is a critical statute in the state of Tennessee, as it affords the chance of a better life for abandoned newborn babies, but continued public awareness of this Law is necessary to fulfill the goals of protecting all newborn infants and providing mothers with a responsible and safe mechanism to relinquish a newborn infant;

NOW, THEREFORE, I, Bill Haslam, Governor of the State of Tennessee, do hereby proclaim April, 2018 as

Safe Haven Awareness Month

in Tennessee and encourage all citizens to join me in this worthy observance.
