PROCLAMATION

BY THE GOVERNOR

WHEREAS, Reverend Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr., born on January 15, 1929, was the transformational leader of the American Civil Rights Movement and one of the most influential figures in world history; and

WHEREAS, Dr. King's message of peace, freedom, justice, and equality for all through non-violent means can never be forgotten and his famous "I Have A Dream" speech in Washington, D.C., at the Lincoln Memorial in 1963 lives on today; and

WHEREAS, Martin Luther King, Jr., Day was signed into law by President Ronald Reagan in November 1983 to honor Dr. King's life and legacy as an outstanding leader of the civil rights movement; and

WHEREAS, Tennessee first recognized Martin Luther King, Jr., Day in 1984, even though the first federal holiday for Martin Luther King, Jr., Day was not celebrated until 1986; and

WHEREAS, Dr. King's final call for civility, respect for human dignity, and a better America was envisioned in his famous "I've Been to the Mountaintop" speech delivered in Memphis, Tennessee, on April 3, 1968, and Dr. King's life, legacy, and message live on in the soul of Memphis through the National Civil Rights Museum established at the place of his assassination; and

WHEREAS, the State of Tennessee recognizes the significant contributions of Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr., to the civil rights movement and to the United States of America, and therefore observes Martin Luther King, Jr., Day as a paid state holiday;

NOW, THEREFORE, I, Bill Lee, Governor of the State of Tennessee, do hereby proclaim January 16, 2023, as

Martin Luther King, Jr. Day

in Tennessee and encourage all citizens to join me in this worthy observance.
