## PROCLAMATION

## BY THE GOVERNOR

WHEREAS, fire is a serious public safety concern both locally and nationally, and homes are the locations where people are at greatest risk from fire; and

WHEREAS, home fires killed more than 2,800 people in the United States in 2021, and fire departments in the United States responded to 338,000 home fires; and

WHEREAS, cooking is the leading cause of home fires in the U.S., and 31% of kitchen fires result from unattended cooking; and

WHEREAS, more than half of reported non-fatal home cooking fire injuries occurred when the victims tried to fight the fire themselves; and

WHEREAS, simple steps like ensuring pot handles face toward the back of the stove, keeping a lid nearby, maintaining a three-foot kid-free zone around hot appliances in the kitchen, and setting a timer when cooking can help lower the risk of kitchen fires; and

WHEREAS, Tennesseans can take steps to prepare for the event of a home fire, including planning and practicing a home fire escape plan and ensuring smoke alarms are working properly; and

WHEREAS, Tennessee's first responders are dedicated to reducing the occurrence of home fires and home fire injuries through prevention and protection education; and

**WHEREAS**, the 2023 Fire Prevention Week theme, "Cooking safety starts with YOU. Pay attention to fire prevention," effectively serves to remind us to stay alert and use caution when cooking to reduce the risk of kitchen fires;

NOW, THEREFORE, I, Bill Lee, Governor of Tennessee, do hereby proclaim the week of October 8-14, 2023, as

Fire Prevention Week

in Tennessee and encourage all citizens to join me in this worthy observance.
