PROCLAMATION

BY THE GOVERNOR

WHEREAS, Huntington's Disease is a genetic, neurodegenerative disease that typically affects people in mid-life, and places each child of an affected parent at risk of inheriting the expanded gene responsible for causing the disease; and

WHEREAS, through the Huntington's Disease Society of America (HDSA) Tennessee Affiliate support and services will be provided to families living with Huntington's Disease here in Tennessee; and

WHEREAS, Huntington's Disease is a rare and orphan disease affecting as many as 30,000 Americans; and

WHEREAS, the average lifespan after onset of Huntington's Disease is 10-30 years, and the younger the age of onset, the more rapid the progression of the disease, meaning children who develop the juvenile form of the disease may not live to adulthood; and

WHEREAS, since 1993 when the gene that causes Huntington's Disease was discovered, research into the causes has explored many new avenues and approaches including focus on way to delay onset of the disease, development of effective therapies that may slow the progression of the disease, and ultimately a cure for the disease; and

WHEREAS, there is at present no effective treatment or cure for Huntington's Disease, and raising awareness is critical to the advancement of vital research and support services;

NOW, THEREFORE, I, Bill Haslam, Governor of the State of Tennessee, do hereby proclaim the month of May 2013 as

Huntington's Disease Hwareness Month

in Tennessee and encourage all citizens to join me in this worthy observance.
