PROCLAMATION

BY THE GOVERNOR

WHEREAS, before the first notes of reveille could play on the morning of Sunday, December 7, 1941, at Pearl Harbor, Hawaii, the Imperial Japanese Navy launched a surprise attack that would shatter the peace that had been known since the first world war; and

WHEREAS, when the first wave of airplanes finally turned back towards their carriers, the devastation they left behind of sunken ships and burning airplanes would fuel the American Spirit for years to come; and

WHEREAS, after the second wave of airplanes departed the scene of their crime, the loss of life was staggering and the wounded overwhelming; and

WHEREAS, once the United States was thrust into World War II following the attack on the Hawaiian Island, thousands of men and women enlisted in the military as the cry "Remember Pearl Harbor" resonated in the air; and

WHEREAS, in the days, months and years that followed that "Day of Infamy" the purpose, courage, and esprit de corps demonstrated by our nation carried us on to victory over our enemies; and

WHEREAS, as we commemorate this infamous day in history, we must also bear in mind those that are still entombed in the shallow waters of the harbor and in unnamed graves at the National Cemetery who made the ultimate sacrifice that tragic day; and

NOW, THEREFORE, I, Bill Haslam, Governor of the State of Tennessee, do hereby proclaim December 7, 2015 as

in Tennessee and encourage all citizens to join me in this worthy observance.
